Building Update

Exciting pool news.

Invitations to Tender have been issued to the five short-listed, prequalified and registered builders for the pool and attached facilities. Drawings and updates will be provided once available. The Ausgrid upgrade to electricity is progressing with a site for the new substation being negotiated.

Each year schools will assess their practices against the Framework to inform their school plans and annual report.
























Casuals

- From June 2018, the department has engaged ClassCover to provide a new app-based platform for sourcing and booking casual teachers.
- While a casual teacher can include documentation on their profile, it remains the responsibility of the relief teacher coordinator at the school to verify the credentials of the casual teacher. xecutive Summary

Executive Summary
In order to enhance the sustainability, compliance and the safety of children,
Denistone East Public School has decided to outsource the music program that
has been run by the P&C committee in the past. A tender panel consisting 6
members was setup to oversee the process. The panel has invited 5 service
providers to tender. 3 responses have been received before the submission
deadline. One late submission and one request to extend the deadline have
been rejected by the panel.

The 3 providers have been scored independently by 4 members of the panel. A predefined set of weights was then applied to the scores. The panel decided the scores were too close to decide a winner. Each of the vendors was invited to a face-to-face interview.

The Musical Partnership was unanimously recommended by the panel. It is recommended by the panel that The Musical Partnership is to be offered 1-year contract to run the musical program from 2019 with intention to extend.



Community Languages

- The diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds of Australians who are fluent in or familiar with languages other than English is a rich language resource. The term 'community languages' has been used since 1975 to denote languages other than English spoken within the Australian community.
- Denistone East has successfully applied for 2 community languages – Mandarin and Korean



Community Languages: P&C



There are numerous benefits to being proficient in one or more languages other than English, including personal enrichment through a deeper understanding of other societies, an improved ability to thrive in a multicultural society and global economy, and possibly even improved cognitive abilities and more developed communication skills. Given the stronger language learning abilities of younger children, the New South Wales curriculum could include mandatory learning of a language other than English for all students beginning in add to primary.



Community Languages

- Background speakers from Chinese language backgrounds attend Mandarin
- Background speakers from Korean language backgrounds attend Korean
- All other students are provided an opportunity to attend either Mandarin or Korean. The school funds additional Mandarin and Korean background speaking teachers to provide access to all students at Denistone East in one of our community languages.



Community Languages

- · In preparing a teaching program in Community Languages teachers refer to the K-6 syllabus documents.
- · The K-10 Languages Syllabus has most elements necessary for programming however the actual language and teaching and learning experiences are for the teacher to design.



Uniform

The department supports the wearing of school uniforms by students. Schools develop their own uniform guidelines in consultation with their community. Parents should contact the school for the guidelines before their child starts at the school. Many schools operate a school uniform clothing pool with new and second-hand items to keep costs down. Governments must as a priority provide and fund the public school system in New South Wales to the highest standard in accordance with the achievement of the basic aim of education, being to help each individual to progress toward the attainment of their full potential, both as a person and as a member of society. Funding of schools to this level must not depend on fund-raising from the school community, either through direct donations, fund-raising events or from the proceeds of school services such as canteens. Government funding should be needs-based, thereby providing the foundation of equality of opportunity that will allow our nation's children to reach their fullest potential.



Uniform

School Uniform Policy Statement

- 1.6 Each school's uniform must be the result of formal consultation with students, teachers and other staff, parents or carers, and the school community (including the Parents and Citizens' Association).
- 1.12 Each school's uniform requirements should be reviewed when the need arises. Parents and carers must be given sufficient time to purchase items and schools may need to give parents up to three years to change more costly items. All suppliers and retailers must also be notified and given sufficient time to change the school uniform. Each school's uniform requirements, along with a brief statement about who was consulted, should be kept on file by the principal of each school.

Years 3-6 ICAS Assessments 2019

Our school has supported the University of New South Wales ICAS assessment program for a number of years. Up to and including last year, the assessments have been pen and paper tests. ICAS has moved to an online platform in 2019, with testing taking place between the 2nd and 20th September. As you are aware, the online processes involved with NAPLAN were challenging.

Like most schools, our school conducted the assessments during school hours supervised by teachers. The number of students participating in the ICAS tests in previous years indicate that all classes in Years 3-6 will be disrupted during the weeks of the testing time.

After much discussion, our school will not participate in 2019 ICAS. While this may be disappointing, students will not be disadvantaged. The marks obtained from ICAS have never been used to inform teaching and learning, nor have they been used as part of the OC/Selective High School applications. Many of the schools in our area that have supported ICAS in the past have also opted not to participate this year, including (but not limited to): Cherrybrook, Beecroft, Murray Farm, Oakhill Drive, West Pennant Hills, Epping West, Epping Heights, Ryde East, Boronia Park, North Ryde, Balmain and North Kellyville.

We believe there are options available within the local community should you still wish for your child to participate in the ICAS assessments.

FORGIVENESS



Forgiveness refers to giving people a second chance and not holding a grudge. This means: letting go of anger and sadness when someone has made a mistake. When ready to, saying "I forgive you" when someone apologises, and not remaining upset. It involves understanding that we all make mistakes and being able to move on.

It is necessary to honour the hurt/grief caused by an action before you can then forgive yourself or others. Forgiveness does not mean forgetting or accepting someone's behaviour. You don't have to agree with what has happened to forgive.


